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The UNITED NATIONS at 70: A Celebration

With balloons flying and participants wearing UN blue, NGO representatives, including four from DKG, gathered on October 22nd to launch the first of several birthday events in honor of the UN's 70 years. The two panels prepared for this initial celebration focused on the relationship between the UN and NGOs/civil society by looking back and looking forward.

The first panel, composed of NGO representatives from three groups whose advocacy for worldwide peace predated the existence of a United Nation's charter, spoke to long-standing ties to the UN. Representatives from the Lions Clubs International, Rotary International, and the League of Women Voters (LWV) each outlined their organization's UN relationship and how they maintain that strong bond today. From the Lion's work with eye care for children to Rotary's ongoing goal to eradicate polio to the LWV's message of gender equality, these three groups painted a picture of possibilities being realized through the efforts of their members. 'Remarkable' was the word that best summed up the past and current efforts of these three NGOs.



Speaking to the future of the UN and NGO/civil society relationship were representative from three youth generations: World Federation for Ukrainian Women's Organizations, Call of Culture and International Association for the Advancement of Innovative Approaches to Global Challenges, Caring for Cambodia.

Each speaker addressed how youth will help the UN attain the recently adopted Sustainable Global Goals by 2030. First and foremost they addressed the need for all generations to

understand and tap the power of youth. This power is more than being able to use social media. Youth understand the inter-connectedness of the world and desire to contribute to the future. While they may seem passive to reform, in reality they feel detached from the process. These three youth representatives urged older generations to consult them, to let them be part of the planning stages, and most importantly to trust them. What they want from older generations is access to grow and the opportunity to move the UN forward during the next 70 years. They view themselves as partners with the strength to push the goals of the UN toward realization.

Following a lively Q & A discussion the event ended with a slide show featuring key moments in UN/NGO groups over the last 70 years. DKG's contribution noted the presentation of a check at the 2012 DKG International Convention in New York City representing total contributions to July 2012 to the Schools for Africa Program, UNICEF/US Fund.



The Sustainable Development Goals: Pathway to the World We Want

On September 25, 2015, as the United Nations celebrated its seventieth birthday, the General Assembly adopted the 2015 – 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) at the UN Headquarters in New York City. The seventeen SDGs were developed based on the evaluation of the eight Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) which were implemented between 2000 and 2015. The MDGs met many of their benchmarks: poverty was reduced; more children, especially girls received a primary education; infant and child mortality was decreased; many diseases were contained or eradicated; clean water and sanitation were more available and there was greater gender equality. Although some progress was made in these areas there is much work yet to be done. More than anything, the MDGs proved that setting goals and working together does enable us to create a better world for all!

To develop the SDGs, the “My World” survey (<http://vote.myworld2015.org>) enabled everyone worldwide, with access to computers, to choose six priorities for their families from the sixteen listed. In addition, extensive efforts were made to include all citizens in developing countries. Interviewers visited communities of farmers, indigenous peoples and migrants. You may see the ongoing results at <http://data.myworld2030.org/>. The millions of responses were considered to determine the seventeen SDGs. The NGOs (Non-governmental Organizations) held a conference in New York in August of 2014 to

enable the workers “on the ground” to share what they felt still needed to be accomplished. Several of your Delta Kappa Gamma NGO representatives attended and participated in this process.

Also, the *High-Level Panel of Eminent Persons on the Post-2015 Development Agenda* was established by the UN to determine which of the MDGs would be continued and to suggest future goals. A continued focus is on the most marginalized people - those living in extreme poverty, with disabilities, in indigenous communities, unemployed, and women and children living with violence. New goals include economic considerations, including responsible production and consumption, free and fair trade and job security. Environmental factors including climate change will be expanded. A new transparency, accountability and financial stability will promote good governance. Eventually, violence, conflict and war will be eradicated by collaboration among peoples and nations leading to a world of peace.

The MDGs were implemented by the UN, governments and civil society including NGOs working around the globe. The SDGs will now require the commitment of a new global partnership based on cooperation, solidarity and mutual accountability. This partnership will include the UN, world leaders, nations, states, communities, civil society, business, scientists and academia, philanthropists and the private sector including all ordinary citizens everywhere.

The one hundred and sixty nine targets listed under the goals are expressed in measurable terms to be monitored and evaluated and will be achieved only when all income and social groups have met the target. With the current data revolution, we can improve the quality of feedback to citizens and progress monitoring. No one should be left behind!

Each citizen of the world must make these goals a part of their daily lives! Teachers must educate their students about these global goals and live them in the classroom! Governments from villages to nations must integrate them into their plans. The voices of developing countries must be heard and be equal partners. The SDGs are by everyone for everyone! Together we can all create a world on our sustainable planet, where each person’s human rights, needs, dignity and security are guaranteed.

The 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) or Global Goals

Goal 1. End poverty in all its forms everywhere

Goal 2. End hunger, achieve food security and improved nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture

Goal 3. Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages

Goal 4. Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning Opportunities for all

Goal 5. Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls

Goal 6. Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all

Goal 7. Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all

Goal 8. Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all

Goal 9. Build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation

- Goal 10. Reduce inequality within and among countries
- Goal 11. Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable
- Goal 12. Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns
- Goal 13. Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts
- Goal 14. Conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development
- Goal 15. Protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, and halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss
- Goal 16. Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels
- Goal 17. Strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the global partnership
